1. Purpose / situation

The research and evaluation strategy is being refreshed to include research and evaluation priorities. This is an enabling strategy which will support PHWs long-term strategy.

Since the KRIC meeting of 10 March 2022, we have been progressing four pieces of work:

- 1. Research mapping exercise of current Public Health Wales (PHW) research activities.
- 2. User research into the value users place on our current research, knowledge, analysis, and statistical products and how we can improve their impact.
- 3. Research by the James Lind Alliance into the research and evaluation needs of our stakeholders.
- 4. Internal engagement with long-term strategy leads and workshops with Public Health Wales staff, BET and the PHW Executive team to identify interventions/policies for evaluation and key research gaps.

These pieces of work have now been completed and we have pulled together emerging areas/ policies for evaluation (aligned to the PHW IMTP) and research questions under each PHW long-term strategy theme to help develop our refreshed research and evaluation strategy.

Attached in Annex A is a presentation outlining the principles underpinning our research and evaluation work in PHW and our emerging Areas of Research Interest.

The areas of research interest have been developed

- in discussion with the leads/groups that have developed the themes underpinning the long-term strategy to identify perceived gaps
- by analysing the draft of the IMTP
- in discussion with the Executive Team

There is further work to develop these further following the meeting by

- sharing with key stakeholders as out-lined in the presentation
- testing with key academics whether these are actual evidence gaps or not
- refine into the areas Public Health Wales will lead ourselves

Finally, this will be woven together into a strategy document setting out our principles, ways of working, staff development and areas of research interest.

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This will be brought to KRIC in June for sign-off.

1. Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015

Through the development of the strategy, we are striving to meet the approaches in the Act throughout the process.



The strategy considers the needs of a generation. We are ensuring research and evaluation priorities and ways of working are transparent, so that future changes and unknown technology developments can be taken in our stride. The research and evaluation outputs we design need to find a balance between immediacy and completeness, offering a pragmatic mix of the two.



We are identifying research and evaluation priorities which focus on preventing problems occurring and health inequalities to ensure the health and wellbeing of future generations are considered.



Our data and research will be designed to be open by default and secure by design. We should trust other members of the NHS by default and seek to be interoperable and collaborative with our partner organisations.



In a similar vein to integration, the strategy encourages and enables us to work openly with a wider group of partners to deliver excellent research and evaluation.



The strategy considers the needs of the people who interact with us, both as service users, as researchers, as clinicians and more. By ensuring that everyone involved in the design and delivery of the strategy as well as our research and evaluation products, we can involve more people at every stage, and have

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better services and greater equality of access to them.

- **Receive and consider** this paper on the development of the PHW Research and Evaluation Strategy.
- **Provide views** on the emerging priority evaluation areas and research questions under each PHW strategic theme.
