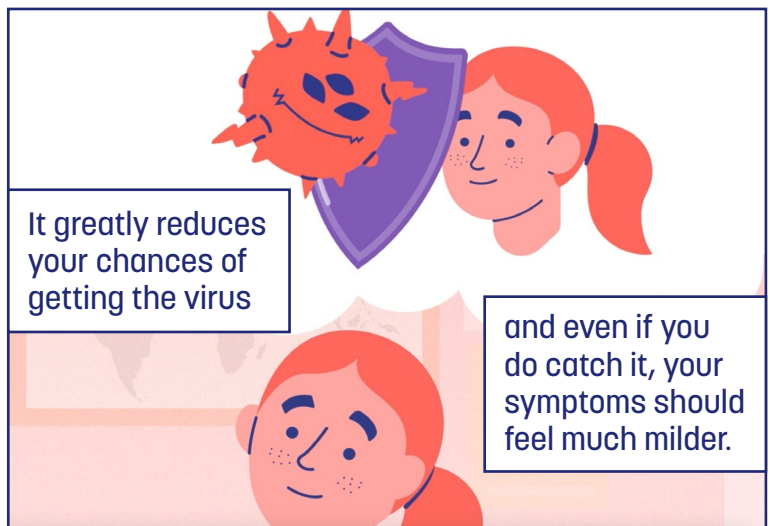
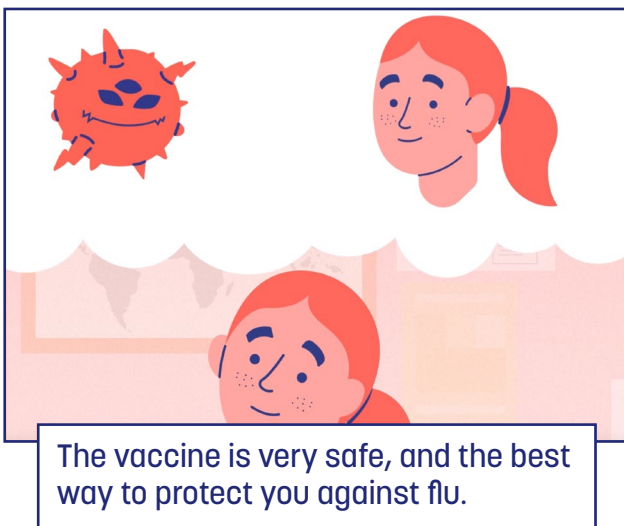
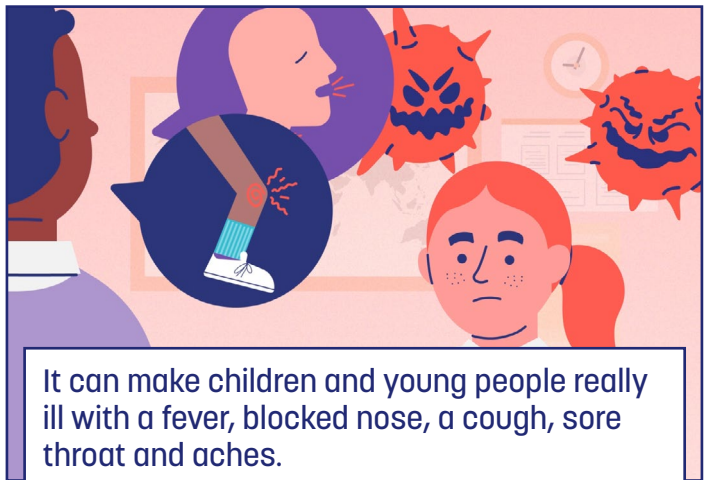
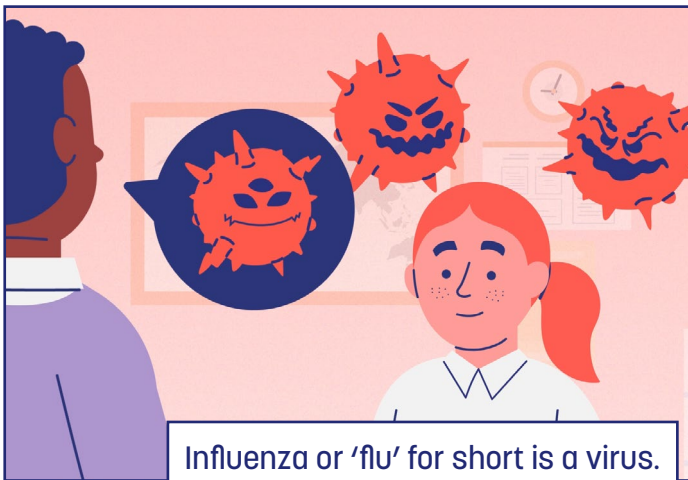
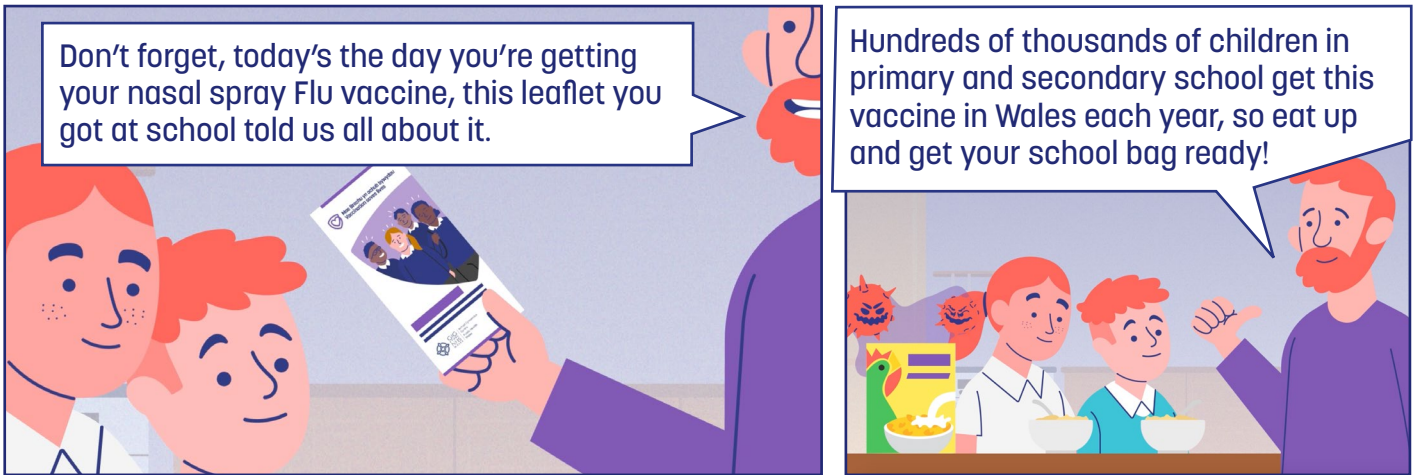




What is the Flu vaccine?

It will be offered to you each year because the virus is constantly changing.

In some cases, you could become so unwell you may need to go to hospital.

The nurse will only give you the nasal spray vaccine if they have consent to do so.

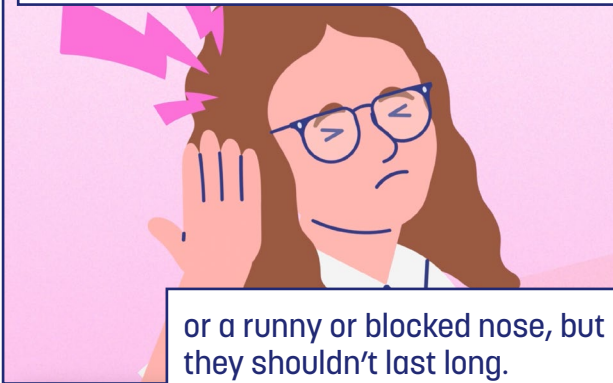


On the day the nurse will check if you're good to go and then the vaccination is given by a couple of quick, painless sprays up the nose.

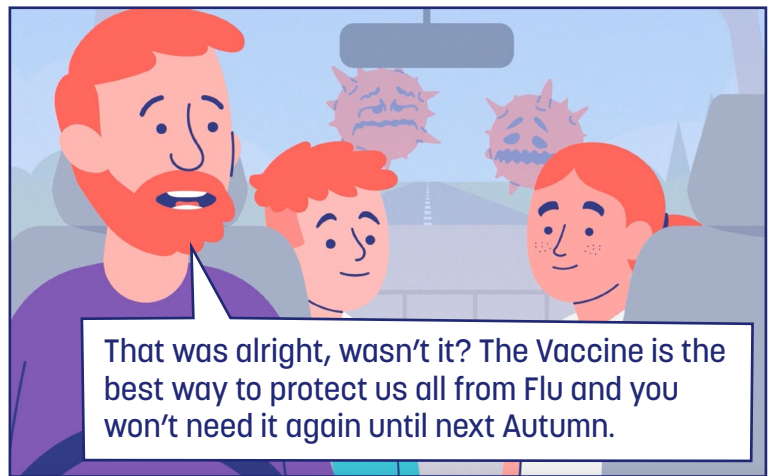


This might feel a bit funny, but it's over in just a few seconds!

or a runny or blocked nose, but they shouldn't last long.
